OUR STORY IS ABOUT PLACES

We believe in creating places that help communities thrive! 2017 saw numerous projects to update our spaces, including a system-wide facilities study, a new meeting room in our North Ridgeville branch, and most notably, the renovation of the South Lorain Branch.





SOUTH LORAIN BRANCH RENOVATION

The fall of 2017 was a time of physical transformation for the South Lorain Branch. The branch underwent a complete renovation, including new carpets, paint, furniture, and more. The new design includes a colorful design palette, which is made up of shades of green, brown, and teal, meant to enhance and reflect the colors in of the trees and greenery of the South Branch's spacious lot.

An important part of the renovation was creating a redesigned children's area to provide a new place for our children to learn and grow.

During the renovation, the South Lorain Branch stayed open to the public, allowing the community to watch the transformation happen for themselves. To celebrate the building's physical transformation and express gratitude to the community, the South Lorain Branch also held an open house with refreshments, great conversation, and a special musical performance by South Lorain's own Latin City Soul Band.

OUR STORY IS ABOUT TECHNOLOGY

We believe embracing technology is the key to our future! From introducing new equipment throughout our branches, to establishing new courses, we are committed to providing our community with what they need to stay ahead of the technological curve.

TEACHING KIDS TO CODE

In 2017, the Lorain Public Library System dove into classes that teach kids the basics of computer coding. From using sticky notes to learning the basics of binary language and creating their own video games, we are helping kids build real skills for future careers.

At the Main Library, 3rd-5th graders gathered every week during the school year to work on a new project and build problemsolving skills by exploring coding and technology concepts and being creative in their solutions. The Avon Branch Library also featured local teens from the high school robotics club teaching the "Scratch" programming language created by MIT.

Other branch locations are also taking steps to introduce coding, while staff members throughout the system are working together to share new ideas and programs that work for our young patrons.




OUR STORY IS ABOUT COMMUNITY

We believe the services and programs we offer are making Lorain County a better place. This year we have focused not only on improving the overall patron experience, but piloting new programs to help the families we serve in tangible ways. As a result, we have formed deeper relationships with new and existing community partners to bring you new programs, including: Avon's Every Child's playground, BOLD Beginning, Summer Lunches.

SUMMER LUNCHES

orain Public Library System partnered with the Boys and Girls Clubs of Lorain County to provide lunches in our libraries for children and teens during the summer of 2017. Meals were provided at our Main Library (Lorain), Domonkas Branch Library (Sheffield Lake), and the South Lorain Branch Library.

Each library also hosted a series of fun programs during these lunch events. Throughout the summer, 670 children participated in the summer lunch program.





BOLD BEGINNING

Brain development in first five years of a child's life is critical to a successful future. With this in mind, BOLD Beginning is a free school readiness program to keep children healthy and get them ready for Kindergarten. The Lorain Public Library System was able to launch this pilot program with funding from the Family and Community Engagement pilot program as part of Ohio's Early Learning Challenge Grant. We were one of only ten libraries in Ohio to be awarded this grant. We wrapped up our pilot program with a Carnival Day at the Main Library, drawing more than 100 participants from all over Lorain.

CELEBRATING LOCAL HISTORY

Our Public Services Coordinator, Valerie Smith, hosted five lunchtime Local History programs this year. In conjunction with one of the most popular programs, "Celebrating the 100th Anniversary of the Lorain Lighthouse," she also helped to compile a book in partnership with the Lorain Lighthouse Foundation. The library then published the book under the title, "History of the Lorain Lighthouse 1917 - 2017."



GIVING BACK

Due to the efforts two of amazing staff members, we were able to spend part of 2017 giving back to other communities in need. Library Assistant Lisa Work spearheaded an initiative to help the people of Puerto Rico— who suffered so much loss to Hurricane Maria—prompting the library to divert patron fines From October through December to the Hurricane Maria Relief Fund in cooperation with El Centro. System-wide, \$4,585.21 was ultimately collected during this period, with many generous patrons stepping in to make additional donations.

Meanwhile, Library Associate Stephanie Brown led an effort to collect books for Ellis Memorial Library in Port Aransas, Texas, which lost its entire collection in Hurricane Harvey. Through the generosity of many patrons and with the help of Friends of the Lorain Public Library, we ultimately collected and shipped 1,015 books to Texas to help this Library rebuild its collection.

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CONNECTING GENERATIONS

Local parents also joined in, bringing their children to enjoy the story time with residents. The Avon Branch has plans to continue growing these important relationships in 2018.

AVON'S EVERY CHILD'S PLAYGROUND

The Avon Branch became a partner in the Every Child's Playground initiative in 2017, building both a wooded story area and a "Story Trail." The Friends of the Avon Library also became stewards to two new Little Free Libraries, built by Lowe's at the playground. Look for programming to begin in 2018! "One of the most exciting things for us this year has been planning the Story Trail and Story Time in the woods, which will begin in April 2018 at the new Every Child's Playground in Avon. We hope you will enjoy the playground and join library staff for these fun outdoor programs while you are there!"
