2018 was year of great change for us at Lorain Public Library System and I am grateful and thankful to our communities and our staff who make it all possible.

In 2018, we celebrated the 15th anniversary of the opening of our North Ridgeville and Columbia branch buildings. We also undertook a major refresh of the Main Library, including the creation of a new space for teens, four new conference rooms for the public with new, modern furniture throughout the library and a refreshed look. We also relocated the public computers to make them more accessible for all.

In 2018, LPLS introduced new services across the system to make it easier for our patrons to use the library, including new self-service printing, faxing and scanning at our buildings. Several behind the scenes changes helped to streamline operations and make us more efficient, which in turn helps us serve the community better.

As always, we helped children learn to read and adults find their next great read or look for a job. We helped people sign up for email and learn to use computers.

North Ridgeville Branch created new space for small groups to use with our Conference Room being finished in 2018. The Friends of the Library paid for decorative stained-glass windows, including a special large story book window custom designed by the Friends and the stained-glass artist. Now small groups can meet in this room to free up the front rooms for larger groups and more people can therefore meet at the same times. We dedicated this room in May and celebrated 15 years in our current building on Bainbridge Rd. with an open house event on May 5. We offer free faxing and scanning service at self-service machines; we now offer Passports; and we offer free downloadable and streaming services for our patrons with the use of their library card from home as well as in the library.




