The Music at Main program was initiated at Main Library thanks to a donation from the Friends of the Lorain Public Library, Inc. The Friends groups at various branches also donated funds for teen and adult Summer Reading prizes, electronic signage systems and held numerous book sales.

Avon Branch Library further focused on the needs of teens with events such as Teen Bake-Off, Digital Scrapbooking, Zombie Prom and Extreme Pumpkin Carving. The Avon Branch also started a Teen Volunteer Group.

Our libraries took part in a vast number of activities in 2012. We were represented at the Lorain International Festival and the Lorain County Fair, and in a Cinco de Mayo Parade, the Columbia Homecoming Parade, the DuctTape Festival Parade, Fall into Avon, a Juneteenth Parade, various Memorial Day Parades and the Sheffield Lake Community Days Parade. We also hosted art shows and gave library tours to children in school.

A number of special events took place at our various branches, including Hispanic Heritage (South Lorain), Fur, Fins and Feathers (Domonkas) and the "Our Zoo To You" program and an inflatable Skylab that were hosted by a number of our libraries. In addition, numerous clubs meet regularly at our libraries, including Garden (Columbia) and Yarn (Main) to name a couple. The North Ridgeville Branch Library started a writers' group in 2012.

WiFi is free at all of our libraries, and improvements have been made to make our Internet faster and more reliable. Patrons can take a wide range of technology classes utilizing our new computers, monitors and printers.

LPLS hosted Touchdown for Reading, a fall online reading program, with the Cleveland Browns and the Cleveland Clinic.

102,607 patrons held library cards.

863,626 visits to our libraries.

2,302 library programs were offered with 46,166 in attendance.

Community groups used our meeting rooms 807 times, with a total attendance of 12,988.

Citizens used our public computers 200,077 times.

1,240 children and teens completed the Summer Reading Program, with 10,816 books distributed as prizes to those who took part. The program was funded through a grant from The Stocker Foundation. Key partners were Lorain County Metro Parks and the Lorain County Ironmen baseball team.

Main Library partnered with the Earned Income Tax Credit Coalition to offer free income tax return filing. More than 100 returns were completed, helping bring refunds of more than \$115,000.

Library users made a total of 10,650 Freegal music downloads.

17,981 people visited the Bookmobile.

847,301 visits were made to our website.
